

MEETING OF THE TEXAS WORKFORCE COMMISSION

July 7, 2020

TUESDAY, JULY 7, 2020

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Good morning, everyone.

This meeting is called to order. Mr. Trobman, has anyone signed up for any public comment?

Mr. Trobman: Good morning. We do not have anyone signed up for public comment this morning.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Okay. Thank you very much. Good morning, Ms. Miller.

CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Okay. Then let's move to Agenda Item 8, discussion, consideration and possible action regarding publication for public comment of proposals relating to contracts and purchasing [unintelligible] Texas administrative code Chapter 800.

SUSAN DURSO: Good morning, Commissioners and Mr. Serna. This is Susan Durso. For the record, I'm Susan Durso, the Director for Procurement and Contract Services.

Before you today I have a proposed rule amendment to Chapter 800 related to contracts and procurement. These rules are required by certain sections in the Texas Government Code.

Section 2261253 requires agencies to establish by rule a procedure to identify contracts that required enhanced contract performance monitoring. We have that policy and procedure in place. We just now need the rule. Section 2155076 requires agencies to establish by rule procedures for resolving vendor protests related to purchasing

1 issues. Again, we have that procedure in place. We need the 2 rule. And section 2252202 requires agencies to adopt rules that 3 promote compliance with a requirement that iron and steel 4 products used in our projects be produced through the United -- in 5 the United States. And, lastly, we have a rule amendment to 6 800.3 to correct a citation regarding historically underutilized 7 business program and controller division references. 8 If approved today, these rules will be 9 published for comment in the Texas Register. I'm happy to 10 answer any questions you might have. 11 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Comments or questions? 12 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: None, Chairman. 13 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: None here. 14 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Do we have any motions? 15 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: I move that we 16 publish the proposed rules for amendments to Chapter 800 17 regarding contracting and purchasing to the Texas Register as 18 discussed by staff. 19 COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Second. 20 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: It's been moved and seconded and we're unanimous. 21 22 SUSAN DURSO: Thank you. 23 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Let's move to Agenda Item 24 9, discussion, consideration, and possible action regarding 25 publication for public comment of proposed rules pertaining to

the Agricultural Improvement Act of 2018 and the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program in employment and training good cause process. That's [unintelligible] Chapter 813.

JOEL MULLINS: Good morning, Chairman,
Commissioners, Mr. Serna. For the record, this is Joel Mullins
with Work Force Development. The Federal Agricultural
Improvement Act of 2018 reauthorized the Supplemental Nutrition
Assistance Program and [unintelligible] to the employment and
training component of that program. The Act contains provisions
that affect program administration, including changes mandated
by the law and provisions that provide additional flexibility to
states.

To comply with the Act, TWC must incorporate the relevant provisions into our Chapter 813 rules, including clarifying language [unintelligible] in case management and job retention services, an expanded definition of a work program as it relates to veterans, clarification of the role of the employment and training provider in the good cause determination process, and the removal of certain services and addition of other allowable services. A policy concept was approved on January 7 outlying potential rule amendments and was posted for a three-week board comment period, however no comments were received.

This morning staff are seeking direction on proposed amendments to the Commissioner's Chapter 813, rules for

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publication in the Texas Register for a 30-day public comment

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1 about this, Item 12, discussion, consideration, and possible 2 action regarding policy concepts on amendments to Chapter 806, 3 that's 40 [unintelligible] Chapter 806, [unintelligible] from 4 people with disabilities. 5 UNKNOWN MALE: Michael? COMMISSIONER DEMERSON: Gonna need to 6 7 unmute him, or he needs to unmute. 8 UNKNOWN MALE: Mr. Chairman, I'm gonna--9 MICHAEL HOOKS: I've got it. I've 10 [unintelligible]. 11 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: There he is. 12 MICHAEL HOOKS: Good morning, 13 Commissioners, Mr. Serna. For the record, I'm Michael Hooks 14 with the VR division. Today I'm [unintelligible] for your 15 consideration and possible action policy that [unintelligible] 16 amendments to Chapter 806 for the purchasing from people with 17 disabilities program. [Unintelligible] making this twofold. 18 One is to incorporate into rule requirements established by 19 Senate Bill 753, the [unintelligible] legislature regarding 20 elimination of [unintelligible] minimum wage as a payment to persons with disabilities working in the CC--or the 21 22 [unintelligible] program. 23 The second is to revise and add ruling 24 which should improve the effective operation [unintelligible] of

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the PPD program.

1 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: Gonna be listening 2 to this one. 3 MICHAEL HOOKS: The policy lays out 12 4 issues for commission consideration. I recommend that I present 5 the 12 and the decision points to allow you to be able to take a 6 vote on the entirety, but I can certainly do it and have you 7 take a vote on each one if you would prefer. 8 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: I would--I agree with 9 doing it in its entirety. All right. 10 COMMISSIONER ALVAREZ: I agree, as well, 11 Chairman. 12 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right, well then 13 let's do it that way. 14 MICHAEL HOOKS: Super. All righty, so I'll 15 start with issue number one, requirements of the transition and 16 retention plans, or TRPs. [Unintelligible] must assist their 17 community rehab programs, or CRPs, and developing transition and 18 retention plans, including having them refer to the VR program. 19 We're seeking direction on amending 806 to include the 20 requirements [unintelligible], the goal of full transition by 21 January 1 of 2022, and expectations for compliance 22 [unintelligible]. 23 Issue number two is extensions of TRP 24 deadlines and withdrawals from the PPD program. Senate Bill 753 25 allows but does not require TWC to extend deadlines for

compliance. We're seeking direction on amending 806 to allow CRPs to request by March 1 of '22 an extension through April 30, '23. If the CRP has met requirements for extension as specified in Senate Bill 753, met the TRP requirements and requested technical assistance before requesting the extension. Requires—it also requires TRPs to notify TWC no later than March 1 that the CRP intends to withdrawal [unintelligible] program. And then allow CRPs to appeal if TWC does not grant a requested extension.

Number three, item--issue number three, the Senate Bill 753 states that the new CRPs certified before the statutory deadline of September 1 of '22 [unintelligible] not have to meet 753 requirements to be eligible to participate prior to that statutory deadline or an extension date granted by TWC, whichever is later. The maximum extension that we can extend is one year. We're seeking direction on amending 806 to require that all entities that do not meet minimum wage requirements and that request CRP certification after the statutory date request extension of March 1, 2022 and meet minimum wage requirements by September 1, '22.

Item number four, [unintelligible]
exemptions from the minimum wage requirements. Senate Bill 753
allows but doesn't require TWC to exempt CRP employee from
minimum wage requirements based on certain circumstances. We're
seeking direction on amending 806 to allow extensions to the

minimum wage requirement and to establish criteria and the processes for granting those exemptions to the minimum wage requirements.

Issue number five, WIOA referrals to community rehab programs. 753 establishes a connection to VR, but WIOA requirement for competitive integrated employment prevents CRPs from working with VR to offer employment opportunities due to the current 75 percent direct labor hour contribution by individuals with disabilities requirement in rule. [Unintelligible] the 75 percent requirement is not a statutory requirement but one in rule. We're seeking direction on amending 806 to allow TWC to establish a percentage different than the 75 percent for a CRP that proposes to participate in the PPD program and offer employment opportunities for individuals with disabilities that meet the WIOA definition of competitive integrated employment.

Number six, compliance with state law.

There is requirement and law or rule that CRPs must comply with other laws, regulations, and agency requirement. We're seeking direction on amending 806 to require CRPs participating in PPD to be clear of any debts related to unemployment insurance, taxes, wage claims, and to meet state licensing, regulatory, and tax requirements applicable to the community rehab program. A CRP that does not meet these requirements would be involuntarily

removed by relocation of their certification to participate in the program.

Number seven, the PPD advisory committee.

Current rules address the role of the advisory committee but do not address how the committee's activity, advice, or recommendations, will be communicated to the commission. We're seeking direction on amending 806 to clarify the method of communicating advice, activities, and/or recommendations of the advisory committee to the commission.

Number eight, the commission approval of products and services. [Unintelligible] code does not require that the commission approve products and services, the rule does. We're seeking direction on amending 806 to allow the review and approval of products and services be conducted by the TWC's executive director or deputy executive director rather the commission.

Item--issue number nine, determination of a worker with a disability. The human resources code and rule define disability for the PPD program but do not address who can make the determination that someone has a disability. We're seeking direction on amending 806 to further clarify disability determination requirements by the effective date of Chapter 122 to include the following: the qualifications for the individuals or entities that determine and document whether an individual meets the definitions of a work-related disability and the

requirement that the individual or entity making that determination be an independent, not a CRP entity.

Rule requires that CRPs maintain payroll records, human resources, functions, and other administration functions but do not specify that the CRP must be the employee unit. Staff seeks direction on amending Chapter 806 to require that the CRP or entity designated by the CRP to be the employment—employing unit worker disabilities who are counted towards the CRP certification for the PPD program.

Issue number 11, clarifying appreciable contribution and value added my individuals with disabilities. Rules define appreciable contribution and value added but do not describe how the agency determines if that criteria is met.

We're seeking direction on amending 806 to provide criteria for determining if duties performed by individuals with disabilities qualify as value added. For example, consideration of value added may afford some flexibility regarding labor and market conditions relative to the proposed good or service in the degree to which duties and tasks performed by the individuals with disabilities employed by CRPs are transferable to the labor market.

And, finally, issue number 12, rule review of Chapter 806. Texas Government Code requires that every four years every state agency review and consider [unintelligible]

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   revisionary appeal each rule adopted by that agency. The issues
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   [unintelligible] this policy concept result from a review of
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   Chapter 806 consistent to the requirement of the Texas
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   Government Code. We're seeking direction on including in the
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   preamble of the rule amendments of Chapter 806 outlined in this
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   policy concept a statement that the rules have been reviewed and
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    [unintelligible] to Texas Government Code.
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                         That concludes all 12 items of the policy
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   concept. I'm open to any questions that you may have.
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                         CHAIRMAN DANIEL: All right, comments or
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   questions?

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   approve the policy concept for amendments to Chapter 806 as
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   discussed by staff.

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                         CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Thank you. Let's see, we
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   have nothing under Agenda Item 13, statewide initiatives. Let's
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   move to Agenda Item 14, discussion, consideration, and possible
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1 action regarding guidance on resource utilization and implementation of services and strategies to target disaster 2 3 relief efforts and public health emergencies, including those 4 funded with the Department of Labor's Disaster Dislocated Worker 5 grant. ED SERNA: Mr. Chairman, Commissioners, 6 7 this is Ed Serna, Executive Director. We really have no 8 significant changes to report under this item, either in 9 employment services or unemployment insurance or childcare, but 10 I will say that we are seeing--continue to see a slight increase 11 or uptick in the number of individuals that are returning into 12 the system to file claims, continuing claims. Staff is also 13 doing very good with regard to handling the workload that we are 14 dealing with, but we have nothing else to report. 15 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: Okay. We'll move, then, 16 to Agenda Item 15, discussion, consideration, and possible 17 action regarding approval of a local Workforce Development Board 18 nominees. 19 SHUNTA WILLIAMS: Good morning, Chairman 20 Daniel. Can you hear me? 21 CHAIRMAN DANIEL: I can. 22 SHUNTA WILLIAMS: Okay. Perfect. So good 23 morning, good morning, Commissioner Alvarez, Commissioner 24 Demerson, and Mr. Serna. For the record, Shunta Williams with

the Workforce Development Division. And before you for

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   consideration, we have Workforce Board nominees for Workforce
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   Solutions, Brazos Valley, Cameron County, East Texas, North
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   Central Texas, the Heart of Texas, Permian Basin, and Rural
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   Capital Area. Staff recommends that all nominees be approved at
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   this time, and I'm here to answer any questions you may have.

Last night the U.S. House Appropriations Committee released the draft text for their fiscal year 2021 Labor, Health, and Human Services and Education Funding Bill. The House of Appropriations' subcommittee of Labor, Health, and Human Services and Education will be holding a markup on the bill later today. The draft bill includes 196.5 billion in overall funding, which is an increase of 2.4 billion above the fiscal year 2020 enacted levels and 20.8 billion above the president's fiscal year 2021 budget request.

A summary of the funding levels in comparison to the president's budget proposal for fiscal year 2021 [unintelligible] year 2020 was sent to your offices last night. We'll continue to monitor the two Congressional hearings this week. Today at noon is the U.S. House Financial Services subcommittee on national security. International development and monetary policy will be holding a hearing on paycheck security, economic perspectives on alternative approaches to protecting worker's pay during COVID-19. And, then, as I mentioned earlier, the U.S. House of Appropriations subcommittee on Labor, Health, and Human Services and Education will have their markup at 5:00 p.m. today.

We continue to monitor Congressional action on potential legislation that would provide further assistance

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   to those affected by COVID-19. And I'm--this concludes my
